History of the Workforce Development Council:

The Noblesville Workforce Development Council began in the fall of 2012 to provide strategies and collaborative approaches to improve workforce preparedness and training for individuals to enhance the Noblesville business environment. Using collective impact strategies, the council has fostered the work done by many in our community to ensure our residents are "work ready." Successful cities have strong, sustainable work forces, and this effort works to enhance the workforce sustainability in Noblesville, with an eye towards providing every citizen with an

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opportunity for meaningful employment. Our council has provided a single source within Noblesville for educators, businesses, state employment specialists, non-profit organizations and city government to coordinate and incubate ideas.

Members do the hard work of implementing these ideas but the council is a place to develop them. To date, council members have supported efforts to:

- Successfully advocate for Ivy Tech Community College to have a Hamilton County Campus in Noblesville.
- Expand the dialogue with educators to promote trades education in addition to college preparation.
- Help launch a very successful high school internship program with area businesses.
- Help launch a summer high school internship program.
- Host two CEO Summits to connect and educate our manufacturing businesses on high school and college programs.

Another project has been a healthy conversation on the critical "soft skills" needed by individuals to be successful in all their endeavors. We are proud to present Noblesville Works, a community-wide campaign to promote twelve key skills for every member of our community.
